



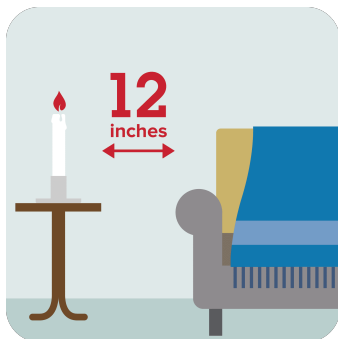

Candle With Care

Reduce the risk of fire from candles in your home

In 2019, there were 75 fires in homes that were caused by candles. More than one-third of home candle fires started in the bedroom. Three of every five candle fires start when things that can burn are too close to the candle. Flameless candles are a safe alternative to candles. They look and can smell like real candles without the risk for a home fire. If you do burn candles, follow these tips to do it as safely as possible.



3 Tips for Candle Safety

1

Distance

Keep candles at least 12 inches from anything that can burn.

2

Attentiveness

Blow out candles before leaving a room or going to bed.

3

Alternatives

Use flashlights instead of candles in a power outage.

Preparing for the Cooler Months Ahead

Getting your fireplace ready

In 2020, there were 539 fire incidents involving chimneys, fireplaces, and wood stoves. These fires were responsible for 3 civilian injuries and 6 firefighter injuries. They resulted in \$3.4 million in property losses. The incidents made up 41% of all fires linked to heating systems. Here are a few tips to minimize your chance of becoming one of these statistics:



- Have your chimney and flue inspected by a qualified mason prior to use. Cracks in the flue or mortar joints can allow flames and heated gases to extend into the structure.
- Most chimney fires occur due to a build-up of creosote, a tarry by-product of burning wood. Have your chimney flue cleaned before each heating season. Burn only dry, well-seasoned, hardwood to reduce creosote accumulation.
